
Remote Audiology (aka tele-audiology)



Check with your audiologist if this is available for your device



Remote Audiology (aka tele-audiology)



Define severity, side and program.

In this example, the patient indicates the problem is annoying, occurs in both ears and in the Outdoor and Music programs.

Select the options that best represent the problem **you** are experiencing.

Tap **Next**.



Adjustments/Repairs If tele-audiology is not available

Contact audiologist via phone or email

Describe problems as clearly as possible:

Not: "it doesn't sound good"

Instead: "it sounds very muffled and I can't understand

speech"

Arrange drop-off at audiologist's office: observe physical distancing!

Check with company: you may be able to mail it back to the factory



Adjustments/Repairs Packing/Cleaning Hearing Aids for Return

Follow audiologist's/manufacturer's recommendations

Do *not* use alcohol (maybe)

Do *not* use Purell, bleach, etc. (definitely)

The audiologist will treat all devices as "contaminated"

Audiologists will wear protective gear, and clean them thoroughly

General Setup Instructions

Making the most of your video calls





Every video call/conferencing service has a different set up

The setup is often needlessly complicated, unfortunately, but once you've gone through it a few times, it can be learned.

I'll show some set up steps from a few services to illustrate the general idea

For family and friends, settle on one (or two) video services

Take the time to learn as many features as you can.

Learn slowly. Get it up and working reliably first, then find additional features








Video and Sound Troubleshooting Basics

Try going to the settings or preferences for the program you're using Then look for the video and audio (sound) settings and adjust them Be sure that the volume is turned up!





Tips for Better Video Calls and Conferencing



Tips for Better Video Calls and Conferencing

Sit close to your computer or phone
Easier to see you
Better sound pickup
Speak in a normal tone, maybe a little bit slower
Adjust the lighting for clarity (Google "how to light a video call")
Be patient with technical problems. If they're really bad, just hang up and re-connect

Captions

The gold standard remains CART, aka captioning by a live person, like Whitney today Automatic captions can be very good, but...

At the moment, in general, you have to pay for the good ones

Each video service handles auto-captioning differently (if they offer it at all). Use google


to find out what each service does. Some examples...



As far as I know, no automatic captions and no option for adding live captions to the image.

FaceTime







Instructions for live (CART) captions not ready for prime time i.e., requires more steps than a standard user should have to deal with And you will need to pay for CART service

Otter will work with Zoom Pro, Business, or Enterprise plan
Translated: you have to pay for a Zoom account (plus pay for Otter)
Set-up is relatively straightforward

Anecdotally, MS Teams has impressive auto-captioning
But Teams Free does not offer captioning
Upgrading Teams is complicated and expensive (\$150/year plus)
And you need your own domain name (additional expense)






Captioning apps for smartphone might work for video calls for you
There is free captioning on new Android devices, and it's good, but...
The good auto-captioning apps I'm aware of require payments for real usability

For video calls and conferencing, use your computer for video and audio and place your smartphone near your computer's speakers while running the captioning app





Live Caption \$36.00/year

(60 seconds/session in free version)






Otter \$100/a year (100 hours/month)

(5 hours/month in free version)
