



- 3. Use chat for technical questions or sharing information






- 1. Click on the Reactions icon

Side-by-Side Mode

- Your screen should be in Side-by-side mode if you have joined by computer.
- There should be a shared screen with presentation on the left and the speakers will appear on the right in gallery view.
- You can adjust the size of your Side-by-side view by hovering your pointer between the shared screen and panelist videos and click on grey line and slide to adjust to your desired view.
- If you have joined by mobile device or phone. You will have a different view. You may have to scroll between views to get desired one.





PREAMBLE to the SHHH Constitution

We are people who do not hear well, but are not deaf. We tend, increasingly, to be isolated. The existing pattern of community life lacks both means of communication and institutions for us to solve our special problems and live normal lives. For too long, too many of us have accepted a loneliness we are unable to explain to our friends or even to our families. (1979)

38 YEARS LATER 'NEW H.O.P.E.' BEGINS 2016 In HLAA Fox Valley Chapter – Appleton WI

HLAAFVC – FOUNDED IN 1983-84

- Membership was solid with longtime members.
- New people came but often didn't come back.
- Chapter newsletter survey gave some answers.
- New folks needed us to address those 'old words'.
- Old members wanted NEW information.



A creative chapter member came up with the name H.O.P.E. Let's Hear Other People's Experiences! That's how 'the new H.O.P.E.' started.



OUR TIPS FOR A SUCCESSFUL H.O.P.E. GROUP

- 1. For our chapter in-person has worked best.
- 2. Invite people to come talk about "IT". Encourage significant others to come too.
- **3. Hold H.O.P.E prior to or after regular meetings.**



4. Keep it informal. Sit in a circle if possible.

5. Facilitator needs to keep conversation going & not let anyone talk too much. S/he should have a few side topics to introduce.

a. Demonstrate a piece of technologyb. Ask about specific experiences

6. Don't let H.O.P.E. separate from the chapter.



7. Don't let H.O.P.E become a CI group.

8. Have a separate CI Group.

9. Always promote the chapter's activities and needs.

10. Involve the H.O.P.E. folks as volunteers. The feeling of 'ownership' keeps them coming.



REMEMBER:

The H.O.P.E. subgroup is intended to address those '*early words*'.

But first...My Hearing Loss Story

Bimodal: Resound hearing aid and Cochlear America CI

Noticed high frequency hearing loss confirmed by an audiologist in my mid 40s

Got first set of hearing aids 5 years later when I was teaching

Wore succession of hearing aids for almost 20 years

Cochlear Implant 2020







Getting Started Virtually

Set time each month: 4th Thursday at 4:00 p.m.

Make sure ASR captions are available

Send out email to members, put on website and groups.io

Everyone welcome from HLAA. Fun to meet new people

Number of attendees doesn't matter

Time limit 1 1/4 hours to prevent listening fatigue

1 or 2 Facilitators at each meeting to keep group on task





Part 1: Introduce, share, limit time

Introduce HOPE as part of HLAA mission of support and advocacy.

- Let everyone know that facilitator is **not** a hearing health professional or expert on any part of today's meeting. Everyone participating in the meeting is on the same footing because we are sharing our OWN experiences with hearing loss.
- Facilitator explains how group works. Facilitator asks each person to share: What's your name? **Briefly share a success or challenge related to your hearing loss.** 2–4 minutes per person depending on number of participants. Facilitator also shares.
- Facilitator requests participants to **wait for second part to respond**.
- Facilitator keeps notes to make sure that everyone's issues are addressed in the second part.

Part 2: Respond to Experiences

- Participants raise their hand or facilitator may start. Participants speak directly to people in the group offering...
 - ...positive tips, suggestions, experiences
- Facilitator makes sure speech does not overlap



Results

- Gain confidence and lose shame of hearing loss.
- Realize value of helping others with hearing loss
- Learn ways to advocate for self and others
- Improve quality of life through meaningful relationships
- Feel supported and useful
